CSSEF is seeking funding to create The Bloom Space—a Deafaccessible, inclusive, and environmentally enriching outdoor garden and community area at their Wellbeing Hub in Aldershot. This project will transform part of their underused car park into a vibrant, sensory-friendly green space that improves the wellbeing of Deaf children and young people.

The environmental impact will include promoting biodiversity with pollinator-friendly planting. It will also encourage green social prescribing activities to boost mental wellbeing, reduce isolation and support development of confidence and life skills.

The Bloom Space will offer a unique and inclusive outdoor resource that supports not just physical and mental health, but also social connection and environmental awareness. Deaf children often face barriers to accessing mainstream community and wellbeing spaces. This garden will be designed with their specific communication and sensory needs in mind—making it accessible, engaging, and empowering.

Their Blossom Group will be actively involved in every stage of the project. This group support deaf girls aged 7-12 who experience high levels of isolation, low confidence. This garden will also provide their parents with a tranguil place to rest and connect with others.

Chloe and Sophie's Special Ear Fund brightens the lives of Deaf children from ages 0-18 years old, who live in Surrey, Hampshire, Berkshire and London.

Aim of organisation/group:

They aim to provide an everlasting positive impact on their wellbeing and mental health by overcoming challenges, creating experiences and empowering them to be their best selves. Our practical and emotional support helps Deaf children overcome barriers that prevent them from accessing the same opportunities as everybody else. CSSEF come together to change this. They work to 'brighten the lives of Deaf people' by combatting the barriers that can prevent them from thriving.

The Source wish to further develop the environmental benefits of their Bikestart programmes. This new project will enable an additional 120 donated bikes to be re-used and recycled. This includes impacts such as reduced waste, lowering carbon emissions, encouraging sustainable transport and reducing pollution.

Additional information:

The objective of the project is to offer voluntary trainee roles for six local young people to recycle and refurbish 60 donated bikes for local people in need or will be sold to support the sustainability of the project. This will include a 6 month programme for six vulnerable young people / young adults (16-30) who need to boost their wellbeing, who are currently not in regular employment or at risk of isolation. They will then attain certification or professional Cytech qualification in Bike Maintenance.

Many neurodivergent young people (for example) struggle with social and communication difficulties which are core attributes for many jobs. By providing a safe, supportive learning environment, they will offer them a chance to develop transferable employability skills, qualifications, and the confidence, self-esteem and resilience to take into future volunteering or working environments.

Aim of organisation/group:

The Source is a Christian charity supporting local young people aged 11 to 25 years old who are struggling with their wellbeing and mental health. To support our work, we have an environmentally friendly Recycling Project called Bikestart which refurbishes and sells donated bikes, creating a surplus for the charity and has also begun to provide training courses for local young people who require a boost to their wellbeing.
